

Woodfibre LNG: The Project

FROM THE PROJECT DIRECTOR From the beginning, Woodfibre LNG has been committed to listening. So far we've hosted two rounds of community consultation, which included a total of 14 small group meetings and open houses. We've attended more than 300 meetings with people throughout the community, and most recently, in an effort to reach those who haven't been able to attend a meeting or event in person, we've hosted two Telephone Town Halls.

As project director, I am proud to say that these conversations matter. Because of what we've heard in the community, we have changed our plans.

For example, we will now power our plant by using electricity instead of by burning natural gas. This is an important decision that protects our local environment and will make Woodfibre one of the cleanest LNG plants in the world.

Because of what we heard, we also committed to moving our natural gas liquefaction plant on land, instead of using a less expensive facility on the water. This will help reduce marine noise and vibration and helps ensure our project is right for Squamish.

We have expanded the conversation recently by introducing a new "Ask Us" initiative featuring your questions and by working to open a Community Office in Squamish. We have devoted this newsletter to talking about all of these activities, and I encourage you to read the latest updates and take the opportunity to have your questions answered.

Our team is looking forward to hearing from you.

BUILDING A STRONG COMMUNITY, BUILDING FOR THE FUTURE

We are proud contributors to an active and vibrant Squamish.

This past Summer, Woodfibre LNG funded three Quest University Canada research projects that will benefit the local Squamish environment and help us build a better project. Students chose to pursue the following:

Khoya Craig (class of 2016): examined fish spawning habitats and terrestrial biodiversity at the Woodfibre site, Squamish Terminals and the Mamquam River



Daniella Smith (class of 2016): researched psychological factors related to Woodfibre LNG's community consultation process, carried out over Summer 2014



Kyle Kirkegaard (class of 2015): explored and developed recommendations for future management of landfills at the Woodfibre site

We believe the strength of a project lies in the community, and that's why we're doing more than just funding important research. We're also providing support to local groups and organizations in the areas of sport, arts, culture, education and heritage - because these are what make communities strong.

Our main priority is to listen to people in the community and build a project that is right for Squamish.

We understand that you have questions about our project and we want to ensure that those questions are answered, so we're trying a new Q&A format called "Ask Us".

With permission from Squamish residents, Woodfibre LNG is publishing their questions and we're providing our answers in our print and radio advertisements, on our website and on Facebook.

It's part of our commitment to working with the local community and we encourage you to get involved too.



Q: "One of the things that I hear in the community in the last six months or so is the fact that Woodfibre LNG will be releasing warm water, or hot water, into the Sound. So, what will you be releasing into Howe Sound?"

A: Woodfibre LNG will use a leading-edge seawater cooling system. Cooling water will be just one degree warmer than the ambient temperature in Howe Sound, within 10 meters of a diffuser port. That's similar to the temperature differences found in streams and rivers as they flow into the Sound, and it exceeds environmental regulations.


